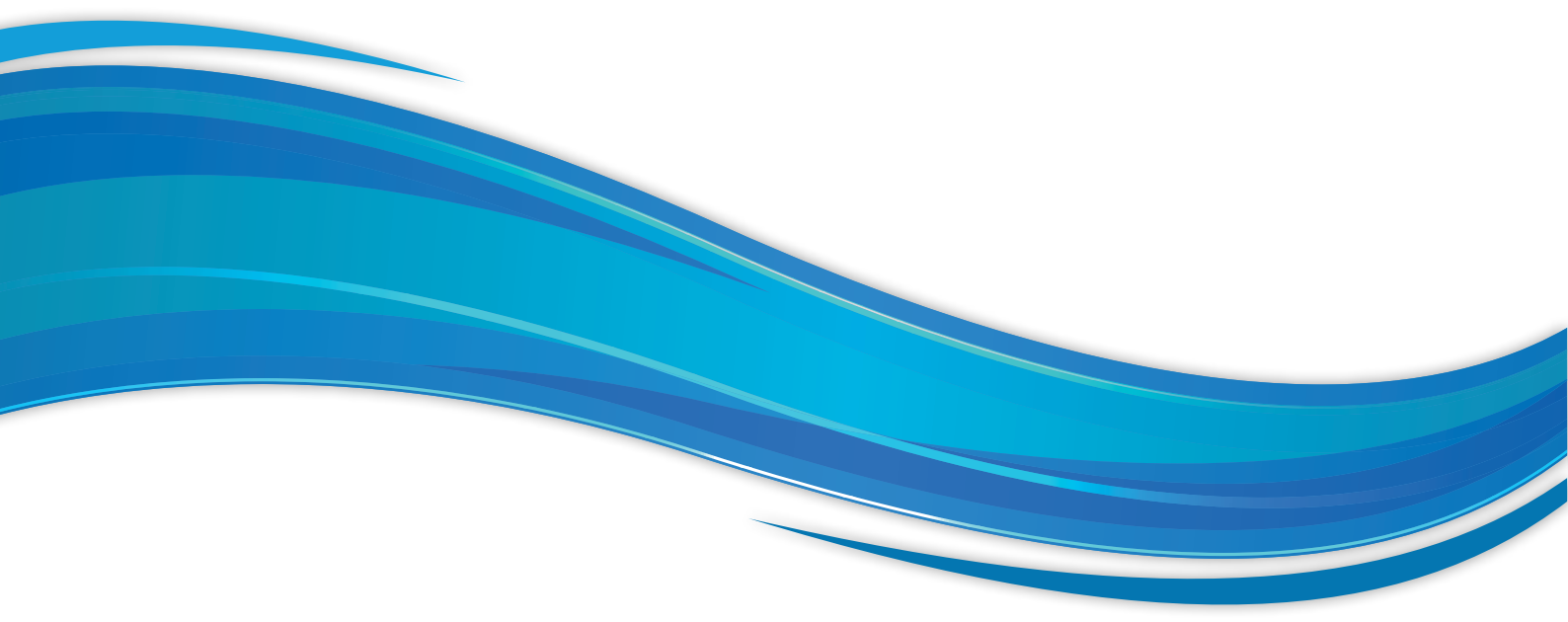

Toni O'Donoghue, Director of Life Saving, headed up our 10 competent and dedicated patrol teams, which patrol Saturday, Sunday and Public Holidays. Thanks to Toni, Patrol Captains and patrol members for keeping the beach safe during the 2017-18 season.

Appreciation to the hardworking members of the Dixon Park Training and Assessing Team capably led by Stuart Barnett, Director of Education. This includes our IRB group, who in addition to providing life saving services to the public, train and mentor our members as drivers and crew. Without our training and assessing team there would be no awards, proficiencies and patrols for that matter. The team carried out and processed 458 proficiencies (up by 100 from the previous season) and numerous awards for members.

Our Junior Activities (Nippers) Section enjoyed another fantastic season, in no small part due to the enthusiastic and capable Junior Committee, officials and helpers that make it all work so well. Special mention to Chad Dagwell for his capable leadership as the Junior Activities Manager. The whole Nippers section continues to go from strength to strength, and the 2018-19 season will be even better.

It has been a successful season for a number of our surf sports competitors. Special acknowledgement to Lisa Wright for her selection as the female captain of the Hunter Interbranch team. Lisa also placed 3rd in the Open Beach Sprint and Flags. Tim Wilkinson, Carl Audley and Gavin Stewart competed in the Hunter Branch and NSW Surf Titles, with Gavin winning 2nd at Branch and 3rd at State in the surf race. Our surf boat crews were again successful – the Masters crew winning the Hunter-Central Coast 'Streets' Surf Boat Series and 2nd at the State titles; and the Reserve Crew winning 2nd at Branch Titles.

The Club had some wonderful social / celebration events including the Nippers Christmas Party, Nippers End of Season Disco, Announcement of Capital Grant, Presentation evening/s, and a Cocktail Party. The Cocktail Party was a great success and thank you to the organising committee, especially Bernadette Cutler.

The 'business' of surf life saving clubs continues to become more extensive and rigorous with increasing regulation and compliance, while at the same time attending to day to day operations, development, growth and sustainability. The members can be confident in the Club's governance and management structure. On behalf of the members, I thank the members of the Executive Committee and the Junior Committee for their dedication, competence and generous contribution to the Club. In this regard, thanks to the Hunter Surf Life Saving (HSL) team for their ongoing support and advice.

Strategically we continue to strengthen our governance and management as a foundation for development, growth and sustainability. This is evidenced through ongoing changes and enhancements to our administration, systems and processes. I acknowledge the support and contribution of Alison Wooden and Geoff Wooden with this aspect of the club.

The Club was notified in December 2017, of its success with a competitive grant submission to contribute to the refurbishment of the lower level of the main building. At the time of this report, we are working with QOH Architects on the detailed design and anticipate construction to commence late 2018 / early 2019. This project will provide new showers, toilets, patrol service spaces, storage, clubroom, kitchen, and disabled access.

Finally, on behalf of the Club we acknowledge and thank Stuart Barnett and Jonathan Murray who will both be leaving the Executive Committee at the end of the 2017-18 season. Stuart is a Life Member who has made an extraordinary contribution to the Club over many years as President, current Director of Education (Chief Training Officer) and Junior Activities Manager. Jonathan has held the position of Director of Finance for 2016-17 / 2017-18 seasons, and was responsible for the implementation of the new financial management system.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club continues to grow and build a solid foundation for future developments. The Club's mission is to provide a safe beach and aquatic environment as well as a healthy environment for members, family and friends to enjoy.

A snapshot of the Club shows 41% nippers, 30% patrolling members and another approximately 30% as valuable supportive Associate and Long Service members. The many dimensions of the Club are evident every weekend of the season.

Financial support is an essential ingredient for a modern surf club. During the season the Club took possession of a new IRB (inshore rescue boat) hull and 2 new 25 hp motors. This renewal is part of a longer term plan of providing life saving services to the community.

Accessing this indispensable source of funding is dependent upon the Club demonstrating compliance in areas such as Financial Administration, Surf Life Saving, Education and Training, Junior activities and Surf Sports.

The Executive group meets on a regular basis, the second Wednesday of each month. Agendas, reports, action plans and minutes not only satisfy the requirements of governance and compliance, but more importantly provides a forum for open discussion and transparent decision making.

All Executive members use their diverse talents for the benefit of the members and the community. Succession planning, that is, the encouragement of other people to be actively involved in the various dimensions of the Club is an ongoing issue.

During the 2017 Annual General Meeting Life Membership status was extended to Geoff Padgett, Arthur Mawkes, Peter Brown and Stuart Barnett. These members were recognised for their contributions to surf life saving and the positive culture of the Club. A highlight of this ceremony was to have existing Life Members; John Tongue, Jack Tomlinson, Warren Hinchcliffe and Dave Ringland presenting Life Membership badges.

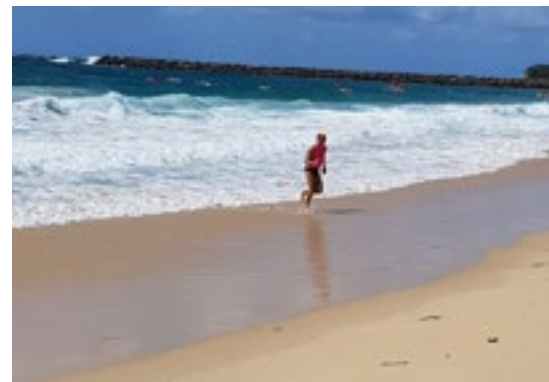

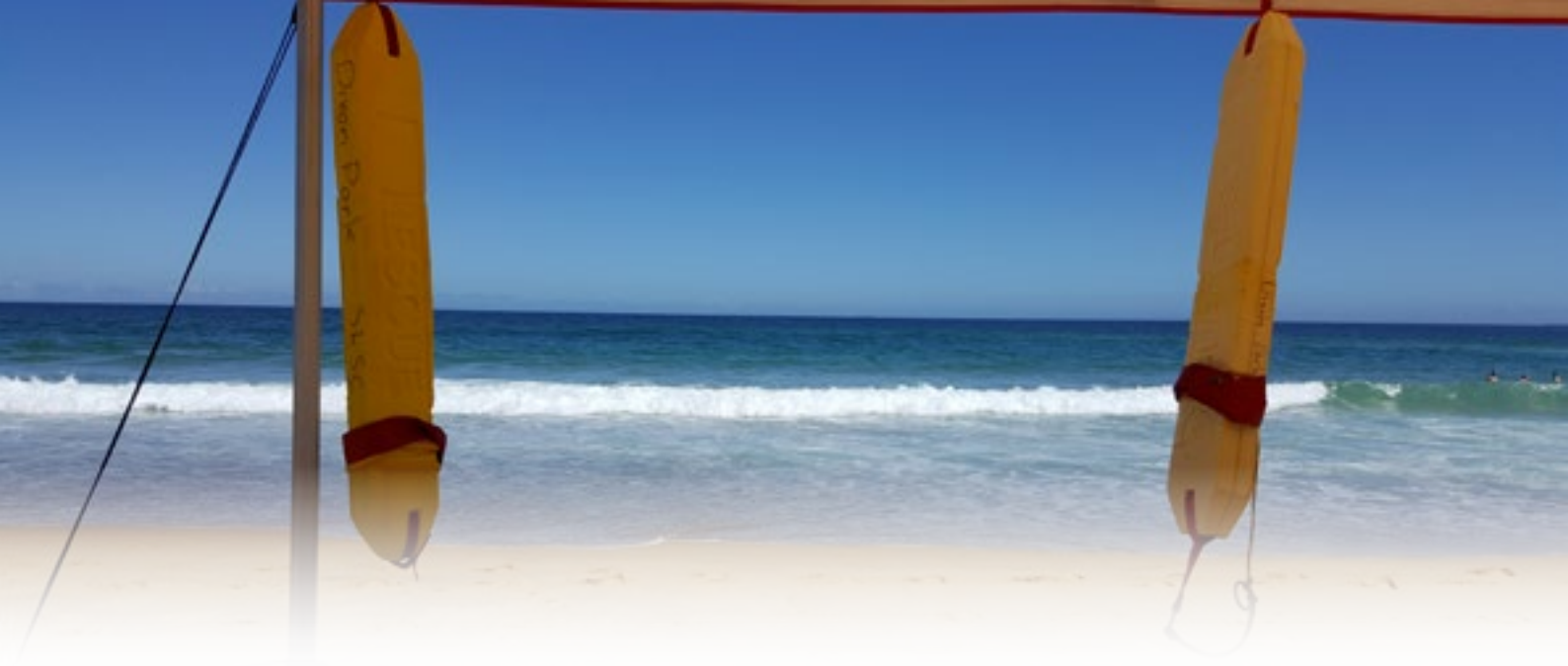

FINANCE REPORT

Dixon Park SLSC Inc. achieved strong results for the financial year 2017-18. Key outcomes include an operating profit of \$75,061 and a cash asset position of over \$333,000. The cash position is inclusive of \$70,000 grants in advance. The main grant is from the St Vincent de Paul Society – Ability Links program to contribute towards the improvement of disabled access to the Club.

During the year, the Executive Committee completed a review of the purpose, benefit, risk and demand on club resources to operate the 'weekend coffee cart'. In the interest of the Club, the Executive Committee ceased the operation of the 'weekend coffee cart'. Other options were sought to provide a similar service which is more sustainable and beneficial for the Club. Our Taste of Greece have assisted the Club in that regard, and their offering is good quality and very popular.

It is pleasing to report that bar sales have increased by nearly \$70,000 when compared with the previous year. Bar sales are generated through Sunday 'Coldies', functions and the Sunday operations of our Taste of Greece. It is clear how important the revenue from bar sales is to the sustainability of the Club. We acknowledge and are grateful to Geoff Padgett (Vice President & Liquor Licence Manager) for his business acumen, and significant effort to manage and strengthen our functions and bar operations.

As reported elsewhere, the Club is engaged in a project to refurbish the lower level of the southern building. The scope of the project includes new male, female & disabled amenities, disabled access, improved patrol service spaces, club room, storage and kitchenette. Planning commenced early in 2017, with the Club

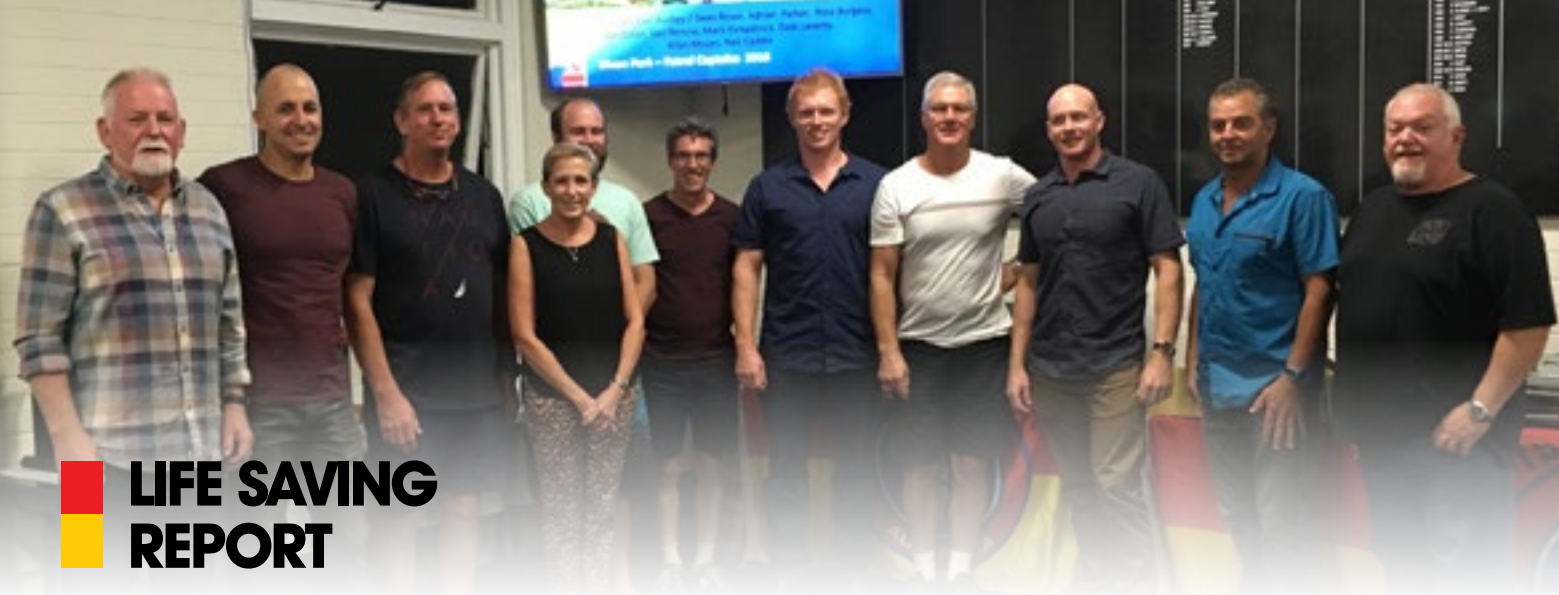
competing successfully for an infrastructure grant of \$350,000 from the NSW Government. Expenditure for the reporting year against the project was approximately \$20,000 consisting of costs for the concept plan for the grant submission and work underway on the detailed design.

The Executive Committee initiated a strategy in 2016-17 to strengthen the governance and management of the Club. This included the implementation of a new financial information system and enhancements to financial policies, processes and systems. Evidence of this is the meaningful and quality financial information to assist in planning, compliance and reporting internally and externally.

We acknowledge and thank Alison Wooden and Geoff Wooden (both Chartered Accountants) for their advice, expertise and significant effort to enhance the financial procedures and processes. The Executive Committee has appointed Alison to the role of accountant / book-keeper for DPSLSC to enable the Director of Finance position to focus more on financial management and business support to the committee/s and the Club.

I thank the members of the Executive Committee for their ongoing support with and contribution to the financial management of the Club.

There were a number of patrols who lost personnel during the year due to relocations and changes in employment. This meant some patrols needed

support from other groups, especially for Sunday patrols. Thanks to our Education Team who facilitated 4 assessment sessions for bronze trainees across the season. These newly qualified members helped boost patrol numbers, with the completion of the SRC by the Under 14's also contributing to improved numbers of patrolling members.

Special mention and thanks must also go to a small group of patrolling members whose volunteer hours went above and beyond normal expectations. They gave freely and generously of their time and expertise to support their own and other patrol groups as required. These members are – Richard McWhinney, John Humphries, Peter Brown, Neil Caddis and Mark Kirkpatrick.

Our statistics for the 2017-18 season from 23rd September 2017 to 29th April 2018, included the attendance of 36,588 people at Dixon Park beach during patrol hours. Patrolling members provided support and protection for the community for 3,188 hours, they undertook 390 preventative actions, attended to 33 first aid incidents and were only required to perform only 1 rescue from the surf. The low number of rescues highlights the proactive approach taken by patrols to identify and manage risks to the general public.

Regular patrol audits conducted by Hunter Branch allow us to review the quality and consistency of our patrol services. Feedback from these audits focused our attention on specific areas where reinforcement of established patrol procedures was required.

Our Patrolling members are the heart and soul of the Club and we hope they continue their commitment to the SLSA mission in the 2018-19 season.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES (NIPPERS) REPORT

I would like to start my report by thanking the 2017-18 Junior Committee for all their hard work and effort that they have put into the season. It truly requires a group effort to make the junior actives run smoothly and give our Nippers a great experience. It is a big commitment to be a committee member but I think everyone would agree that it is highly rewarding

Thank you to the Executive Committee for their support this season. Every request we have had has been met with a positive response which has certainly made the Junior Committee's job easier.

Thank you to the 10 club sponsors that supported the club for the 2017/18 season. The support provided has enabled the Junior Committee to effectively run the Nippers program and also fund the introduction of new club shirts at no extra cost to our Nippers. We hope all the sponsors will be on board again in the 2018-19 season.

REGISTRATION NUMBERS

This year we saw our Nippers numbers increase to 181, an increase of 28 Nippers from the previous season. While the younger age groups numbers were again traditionally strong (ages 6 to 9 – 129 Nippers or 71%), it was encouraging to see a high retention rate and even new Nippers into the older age groups (Ages 10 to 14 – 52 nippers or 29%). The combination of promoting via Facebook and signage on the club as well as word of mouth helped us achieve this growth. We also welcomed a number of families to Dixon Park that had moved from other surf life saving clubs.

The committee took a strong approach to the registration process with the introduction of a registration cut-off date. This meant that we did miss a number of "late" registrations but made the process far easier to handle.



PROFICIENCY

The increased work into improving the proficiency process paid off this year. Our pool proficiency rate was almost 100% across all age groups with only a hand full of Nippers not completing the pool proficiency before the season started or by the 2nd week of Nippers. The Ocean proficiency saw a number of postponed attempts due to surf conditions. A contingency plan to hold the Ocean proficiency at a more surf friendly beach (such as Stockton) next season should be looked at.

AGE MANAGERS AND ASSISTANT AGE MANAGERS

This season saw the number of Age Managers / Assistant Age Managers increase to 27. We were easily able to achieve the required ratio of 1 age Manager to every 20 Nippers in every age group. The club ran Age Manager training during the season to have our Age Managers fully accredited.

WATER SAFETY

The club has also seen an increase of Nippers parents completing the bronze medallion this season with 7 parents successfully completing the course this season. The safety of the Nippers in the water is paramount and especially at our beach where the conditions can be challenging. Thank you to all the parents that provided water safety this year.

CARNIVAL ACTIVITIES

The club also had 3 Nipper Parents successfully complete the carnival official course. The club should continue to encourage and financially support any Nipper parents that wish to complete the bronze medallion and/or the official's course to ensure that these numbers keep increasing.

The Junior Committee continued to focus on improving the communication between the club and parents via the use of the SurfGuard SMS and email system and Facebook. We also continued our Sunday morning briefing before Nippers to ensure that parents were well informed and up to date with current information.

This season we had in impressive 38 carnival representatives with some impressive results in all the carnivals we competed. The club once again supported the Nippers that wished to complete by covering branch carnival entry fees as well as entries to the state carnival. With the increase in carnival participants the Junior Committee will need to look introducing a policy to get more officials and water safety personnel so our Nippers can compete at carnivals.

Thank you to Josh who again ran mid-week board training sessions and also to Lisa Wright for providing beach training during the Nippers season. Our goal is to continue and expand on this type of skills training.





FUNDRAISING AND SPONSORSHIP

Merchandise and swimwear ran without any major issue this season. The normal delay in receiving stock is always expected. The work put into the new club shirt paid off with our Nippers being easily identifiable not only at Dixon Park but also at surf carnivals which gave our sponsors great exposure. The Junior Committee now has relationships with all suppliers which will make the process even easier going forward. The forward planning and ordering at the registration day worked well this season.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The club again provided two fantastic events for our Nippers being the Christmas party and end of season presentation and disco. This club is a family club with a family culture and it was great to see so many of our families enjoying the sunshine, BBQ and jumping castles together out on the Dixon Park grass. The club also ran a Cocktail party which was an amazing night and allowed club members to socialise off the beach in our fantastic function room. The Junior Committee is already looking at adding a Nippers weekend away to the calendar.



Thanks to all parents that helped out this year. The Nippers program is run entirely by volunteers and without the help of parents volunteering their time we would not be able to give our Nippers such a great experience at Dixon Park SLSC.

EDUCATION REPORT

I would like to start by thanking the members of the Dixon Park SLSC Education Team comprising of Stuart Barnett (CTO, Facilitator, Trainer and Assessor), Neil Caddis (Trainer) and Cassie Barnett (Trainer). I would also like to pay tribute and thank Jon Baker for his hard work as the under 14 age manager and his work in preparing the SRC squad for their successful assessment. The team was also assisted during the season by Richard McWhinney and all of the Patrol Captains who assisted with proficiency.

At Dixon Park we offer the "lifesaver award" in our Bronze courses. This means that candidates finish the course with the Bronze, Advanced Resuscitation, Spinal, Radio Operators and where possible the First Aid Certificate. This is of great benefit to the candidate, who is better qualified but also to the Club in so far as Patrol strength is concerned.



We also offer the Surf Rescue Certificate to our Under 14 squad, who are of course the future of the Club. This group is always an enthusiastic squad and true to form as soon as we finished the assessment in February they were all eager to participate in Patrol and have continued to Patrol throughout the season.

This season the Club dealt with Patrol and Junior Activity proficiencies, carrying out and processing 458 proficiencies prior to Christmas 2017, up by close to 100 on the previous season.

This season the Club ran two Bronze Medallion courses, A Surf Rescue Certificate course, Advanced Resuscitation, Spinal and Radio Operators courses. Pleasingly this season we had a good number of Nipper parents attempt and complete the Bronze Medallion. In conjunction with the Junior activities section we also ran an Age Managers Course and the Junior Activities section of the Club also offered and completed the relevant Surf Aware, Surf Play, Surf Safe and Surf Smart awards for the Nippers.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Corporate Information

The financial report is for the year ended 30 June 2018 for Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a Tier 1 association.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 31 July 2018 by the officer bearers of the entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2009*. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with *Associations Incorporation Act 2009*. Dixon Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc has applied the exemption available under Class Order 11/011 in preparation of the financial statements. In this regard the entity has applied recognition, measurement and classification requirements of Australian Accounting Standards for transactions recorded in the financial statements. The financial statements also comply with *AASB 1048: Interpretation of Standards and AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors*.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Accounting Policies

a. Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Government grant revenue is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs which they are intended to compensate.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

b. Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Property improvements and plant & equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Property improvements are amortised over the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Plant & Equipment	10 – 25% prime cost
Property improvements	2.5% prime cost

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

c. Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

d. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

e. Stock on Hand

Stock is measured at the lower of cost or net realisable value

f. Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

g. Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

h. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

i. Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.
